f the title Nice Guys Sleep Alone sounds familiar, it's because the Kentucky-shot film opening today at South Keystone Art Cinemas is based on Bruce Feirstein's book about the complexities of romance and dicey dilemmas of dating.

This good-looking contemporary comedy, written, directed and produced by Stu Pollard, formerly of Louisville, is low-key and sweet-natured, and features polished performances.

He doesn't even want to sleep with a woman on a first date. He's that nice. Dates usually end an evening with Carter wanting to be "just friends," but he has enough friends.

A school field trip to a Kentucky horse farm puts him in touch with Maggie (a complex Sybil Temchen), a lonely New Yorker hired as the farm's veterinarian, but he leaves without making a date or giving her his number.

Maggie, meanwhile, makes a big mistake by going on a date with Robert (Christopher Murray), the area's most eligible — and egotistical — bachelor.

it comes to Carter's first date with
Maggie.

Nice Guys Sleep Alone is a compact film without many fireworks. But it's full of gentle laughs and is steadily entertaining, such as when a horrified class looks on during a horse breeding, Maggie tries to extricate herself from Robert's attention (he leaves enough telephone numbers on her answering machine to service a small town), and Carter muses over his miserable dating record, fending off an unwanted advance from a manipulating hottie named Erin (Vanessa Marcill).

A couple of familiar faces fill small roles in *Nice Guys*, including Morgan Fairchild as the mother of a woman Carter dated, and William Sanderson, the Larry of Larry, Darryl and Darryl from *Newhart*, as the down-home horse-farm worker who dispenses useful advice.

Regional touches abound: Pollard nicely inserts many Louisvilleassociated icons, including Churchill Downs, the Belle of Louisville and Kentucky Wildcat references.

Nice Guys Sleep Alone reflects the "nice" part of the title: Pleasant, fun, hopeful.
